
Dear Brother Knights

THE ACCOLADE OR DUBBING

It is a solemn moment in the ceremony of the installing of a Knight when he kneels before the Preceptor with his head uncovered in order to receive the 'highest honour' that can be bestowed.

We give that moment the ancient description of 'accolade' and the action that comprises it is called 'dubbing'.

What do these words mean and how could we explain them to others in the Preceptory?


What of the meaning of 'dubbing' . This has more to do with the way the accolade is meant to be applied. Dubbing comes from an old Norse word which meant to

"beat or belabour". There is something of its original meaning which is still retained in an old rhyme, 'rub a dub dub, three men in a tub' since this word 'dubbing' is still used in the Scandinavian language for a woman banging clothes to make them clean in a wash tub. In the case of our knight it means the Preceptor is laying the sword firmly, if not roughly, upon a new knight to impress upon him the new status and duties that he is now assuming.

Here the making of one who must be a tough, hard working warrior. The dubbing is to impress his mind deeply even as the blade is laid determinedly upon his head and shoulders. Having become one of us he puts on his cap again to show his equality.

In the light of the Corvid -19 recommendations from the Order little is affected for this part of the ceremony.
