Christmas ushered in with a feast of song

True to our proud tradition as "The Land of Song", the Knights Templar launched the Christmas Season last month with our traditional Carol Service within the Province of Monmouth and South Wales.

Held for the first time in Carmarthen – which claims to be The Oldest Town in Wales – it

seemed very appropriate to start off the music with "Once in Royal David's City" – a song that had distant echoes of Saint David the patron saint of Wales.

Led by The Great Prelate of the United Orders, R.E. Kt. Revd Malcolm Lane, the service of nine lessons and carols was attended by over seventy smiling brethren and family members. The Most Eminent and Supreme Grand Master, Paul Raymond Clement, and his wife Molly attended and provided unexpected extra help at the organ after it was

announced that the car bringing the Provincial Organist, to the happy event had broken down. For him, E.Kt. Terry Price, (on what was a very cold icy day) it was much more a case of "In the bleak mid-winter" regrettably.

The Great Marshal, R.E.Kt. Tim Wheeler, and his wife Mo travelled from Sussex to support the event once again – and they must have

had the longest journey of all. The beautifully warm venue chosen for the event this year was the Ivy Bush Royal Hotel – which also received a nod in the singing of "The Holly and the Ivy".

Held after a short meeting of the Owain Glyndwr Preceptory of Installed Preceptors, the Carol Service was organised principally by their Eminent Preceptor, E.Kt. Nigel Williams, and the Preceptory Registrar, E. Kt Tony Jones. It thus enabled all the Knights to attend in full regalia and to provide an arch of steel at the end of the Carol Service - which was especially enjoyed by the ladies and children.

After the Preceptory meeting and the Carol Service, all adjourned to the bar where local farm workers praised the singing of "While Shepherds watched their flocks by night" even though these local shepherds looked too smartly dressed and spruce to have come in fresh from performing an overnight vigil.

Throughout all the proceedings the brethren enjoying the guidance and organisational skills of the Provincial Marshal, E.Kt. Carl Davies who is also a Deputy Great Marshal.
