The Draper's Tale

Our regalia

We love many things in our Order, especially our colourful regalia. In the days of old, when Knights were bold, each Priory had a Draper, who was a very important person.

He was the custodian of the white mantles. He ensured they were kept clean, and oddly enough, he also distributed bed linen! But, wo betide any Knight who tried to add any embellishments to his regalia such as gold stirrups or silver bridles, which the Draper would remove. No ornamentation to display your wealth was allowed, as all the Kts were seen to be equal in their supposed poverty.



The Draper would also be responsible for checking your beard and haircut, neither of which were allowed to be too long. In fact, the haircut was expected to be short enough to be checked from front and back and any moustache was also needed to be kept trim and tidy. Such was the power of the Draper, that if he thought any Kt had accumulated too many possessions, he would confiscate them! Every Kt was expected to be equally humble as his neighbour.

It most definitely was not an easy way to live!!!



A Templar and a Hospitaller, c. 1250

The Templar (on the left) is wearing a padded arming cap (1), on which his helm (2) will rest. His mail hauberk (3) is now worn over a padded undercoat called a gambeson, and under the surcoat (4) of the Order - white, with a red cross on the breast. The loose, knee length garment is split to the waist at front and back for ease when riding. He has mail leggings and prick spurs.

The Hospitaller wears the black surcoat (1) with white cross which was adopted by the order in 1248; in 1259 this was changed to a red surcoat with white cross. He wears a simple round helmet (2) over his mail coif. Shields (3) have by this time grown shorter and more triangular in shape. The mail leggings (4) are laced behind the knight's calves.
