
Many Knights from Wales travelled to London to applaud the splendid news and celebrate the following First Appointments:

Six Candidates at Malta Meeting

Australian becomes Eminent Preceptor at Cefn Ydfa

At the Meeting of Cefn Ydfa Preceptory No. 579 in June, the Eminent Preceptor, E.Kt. Michael Davies, installed Kt. R. John Hibberd as the first Australian to become Eminent Preceptor and Prior in their history.



The Installation Ceremonies at Bridgend, were attended by the Provincial Prior, with E.Kt. Richard J. Phillips the Provincial Sub Prior, together with a large number of Great Priory Officers, Provincial Officers and Brother Knights. The Provincial Marshal, E.Kt. THE ALMONERS POST

Greetings in the bonds of the Order from the Provincial Almoner, and the hope that you all had a very restful summer recess.

Over the last months we have received a number of emails with news of sickness or those that have departed. You know my reluctance, from my time as a Parish Priest, Area Dean and Hospital Chaplain to publish names in this post without permission.

But, when we receive these notifications by email it gives us the opportunity to remember them and their family as we are a Christian Order, a Christian Community in our thoughts and in Prayer.

Many of these emails' originate from the excellent work of our Almoners, and our thanks to them. Their role is more difficult in some ways as they need to balance their role against the Almoners in our craft lodges.

Many times, that I write I have tried to pass on information from the other Provinces of our Order, Notes of help and guidance. On this occasion I make use of a document produced by the Almoner of my mother Craft Lodge, Loyal Commercial, and my Royal Arch Chapter, Dovey. In him we have an excellent and extremely conscientious Almoner, Kt Michael McNiff, a member of the Provincial Priors Bodyguard in our Order. Mike has produced for our Lodge and Chapter an Almoners Document, which I think says it all. This was sent to all the members of my Lodge and Chapter. I thought it might be useful to you all to see how Mike sees the role of the Craft Almoner and compare how our role in this order may complement that.

I quote this with Mikes permission:

'I hope you don't mind me sending this email to help promote understanding of the role of the lodge almoner and how this can help those in need.

An almoner role is key to providing care to members, their families, widows, dependents, and resigned Freemasons who may be experiencing difficulties in their life.

As almoner and a Mason, I am sure we all try to be caring (empathetic not sympathetic), understanding, and maintaining confidentiality when dealing with sensitive matters.

It is vital to ensure contact across the lodge by all lodge members. This way we can be alert to members that may be ailing or distressed either directly or in relation to their loved ones.

The almoner is then able to contact the member, family or those loved ones of a deceased member and keep in contact with widows and family members.

Almoners are also well placed to promote, where necessary, Masonic charities and provide information on how to contact them.

Freemasonry encompasses the basic principle of caring for others. For centuries we have supported those in need, such as, orphans, the sick, the elderly and many others during times of distress. One of our core values is the importance of looking after the welfare of fellow Freemasons and their loved ones.

Central to providing pastoral care is the almoner. This role originally existed to look out for Freemasons who fell ill, and to act as a source of support and contact for the widows of deceased members over Christmas periods.

The almoner's role over the years had grown substantially and now includes activities such as home visits, being aware of and providing support for those who are in difficulties as a result of cost-of-living pressures, poor mental health issues and the impact and demands of modern life.

Care and home visits are just a few of the activities that can support members, other activities can include:

- Acting as a listener to those who want to discuss their mental health or health concerns.
- Acting as support for those with relationship difficulties
- Support during bereavement
- Job loss and supporting members going through this
- Assisting with tasks such as transport and getting prescriptions, attending hospital appointments, Doctors appointments,
- Helping take members who have transport or mobility difficulties, shopping
- Assistance with financial planning, budgeting, and assessing risks through helping members in their annual budget planning.
- Filling out form and administration tasks such as helping to set up direct debits
- Helping to identify unclaimed benefits they can access

In Masonry as in most forms of voluntary service, a job is what we make it. All members can help Almoners to provide assistance and help in improving the quality of life for those who have suffered hardship or are going through difficult times.

We all hope that we will not have to face financial hardship or major health problems, need help in supporting our children or requiring extra care in our old age.

In reality we know we will have members who need a little extra assistance, we as Freemasons, are fortunate to have that support at hand, to make sure Freemasons and their dependents who are in need of support receive it, when they need it.

As such I ask that members keep in contact with fellow members and let me know of those who may need assistance so we can ensure we support each other.'

I hope that this has been of some benefit, not just to our Almoners but to Brother Knights, just as it was to me as I read it.
